CLASSROOM POLICIES:

Although not everything included in the sections listed in the syllabus will be covered in class, the students will be required to study those sections in their entirety and be familiar and prepared to answer any questions pertaining to the material contained in these sections.

EXAM POLICIES:

- Each of the 3 in-class Exams will consist of 5 questions some of which may have multiple parts. Some questions may be **theory questions** rather than actual problems or exercises.
- Open notes will **not** be allowed.
- Make-ups will not be given unless there is a **verifiable emergency** and notice is **given** in advance.
- Evaluation of your exam is your instructor's responsibility. You are welcome to ask questions on points that you don't understand and point out possible mistakes but you should **not** question the **grading policies.** They are set in advance according to my best judgement and they are applied uniformly to everyone.

HOMEWORK POLICIES:

You will be required to hand in approximately 1 homework set per two weeks. These problem sets will be handed-out at the beginning of some lecture period. **No late homeworks will be accepted**.

The homeworks may not be graded in their entirety but rather a few randomly selected problems from each will determine your whole homework grade. Because of this, and the fact that doing your homework problems will be a perfect preparation for the exams, it is important that you do all the problems in each set.
